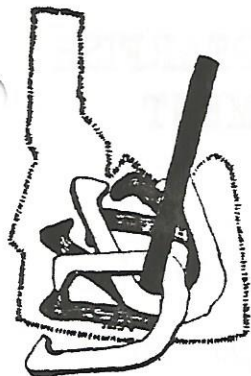

### Third Annual Idaho State DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

**Pocatello August 22**

Intent to Pitch Deadline  
**Wednesday August 18**

**Most Idaho pitchers** now know how to get to the new Brick Thompson Memorial Horseshoe Complex at ROSS PARK in Pocatello by leaving I-15 at Exit 67, the southmost Pocatello exit.

The rules for the 1993 Doubles Championship (keep 'em simple & fun) listed here will be the subject for discussion in Kellogg.

1. Combined total percentage of team shall not exceed 110%. We need a true "A"
2. This will be a non-walking doubles. Players may exchange shoes.
3. High % shooter must pitch against high % shooter and start each match on south pit. Low % shooters start on north pits.
4. Brackets will be kept as close to 5% difference as possible.
5. Scorekeepers will be paid \$1.00 per game to be paid by the losing team at the end of the game (if scorekeepers not available

# The President's Message

## How to check scoresheets How entry fees should be divided

Hello again everyone.

The 1993 horseshoe pitching year is moving along very well. As I write this I'm sure lots of Idahoans are enjoying a vacation and horseshoe pitching at the World Tourney. Good luck to all those who are participating.

It is almost time for our State Tourneys and with good luck and good weather we'll have larger and more successful tourneys in Pocatello & Kellogg.

Remember to select and support the candidates of your choice at the Annual Meeting and Banquet at the Kellogg Elks Saturday night the 28th. For those who are interested in improving Idaho Horseshoes there will be a *preliminary business meeting* Friday evening starting at 7 PM also at the Elks. The purpose of the preliminary meeting is to get all the debate and discussion out of the way so that the official Annual Meeting can move swiftly and smoothly and not run into the wee hours of the morning. I am asking everyone to help with the proposed rules for State Doubles so we can add them to our Constitution and By-Laws. These rules should make for consistency in our State Doubles Tourneys.

I have been asked to explain how to check the score sheets we use for each game in our *sanctioned* tournaments. All must be checked *before* they go on the Summary Sheets.

### CHECKING SCORE SHEETS

Add all ringers for each pitcher. Multiple by 3.  
Add all points that are not ringers for each pitcher.  
Total the points for each pitcher separately. The difference between each players totals should equal the difference in the final scores. If it does not, there is an error. Remember, you are adding *all* ringers, even X - X, or dead ringers when you

multiply by 3. The most common mistake made by scorekeepers is only giving one player an X. This makes a 3-point error in the total score and deprives the player of his or her correct percentage.

### DIVIDING THE PIE

Some questions have been asked as to how the \$10. tourney entry fee should be divided. Except for the \$1. per entry which by law should go immediately to the Secretary-Treasurer, the Tournament Director decides how the division is made. Most of the Directors I have talked to are doing the same thing.

In an 8-man round robin the total is \$80. Retain \$1. per entry for FOUR DEAD! Retain \$1. per entry (optional) for the behind the scene workers who compile the master sheets. Retain \$6. for the 1st, 2nd, 3rd place award plates for the Idaho Plaques. That's \$22. out of the \$80. There are other minor expenses which should be taken into account: round robin cards, score sheets, master sheets, phone calls, etc. Most pay backs for an 8-man round robin will run around \$50 and be split \$25-\$15-\$10. Some clubs don't hold back a buck or two for incidental expenses.

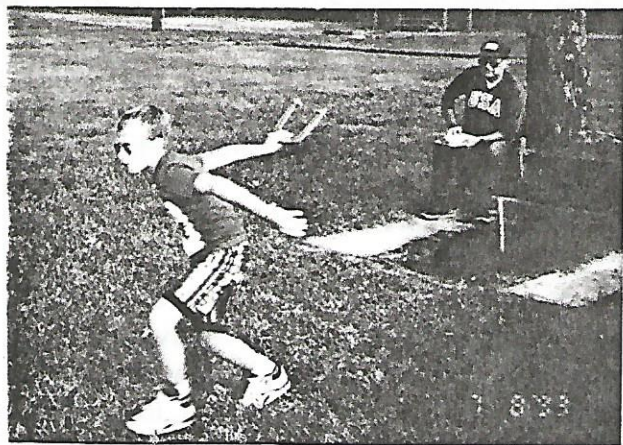
Again, I am not setting policy or saying this is the only way to do it. This is what I have observed and it is up to each Director to run his or her own tournament.

If I have confused anyone, I must be doing my job —ha, ha.

### THE THIRTY-FOOT HANDICAP

Did you ever stop to consider that a 30' pitcher has a 50% handicap over a 40' pitcher? — **yes, 50% handicap!** 25% in *distance* plus 25% in *accuracy* equals 50% total. If we wish to handicap *only* distance and give no handicap for accuracy the width of the horseshoe opening (at 30') must be reduced from 3.5" to 2.73", the opening must be reduced 88% of an inch. That's where the *real* handicap lies, although few realize it.

## START 'EM YOUNG

Kyle Wade McEnany was born on August 30, 1983. He weighed less than a single horseshoe — 2 pounds 5 ounces — and spent his first two months of life in the Sacred Heart Hospital in Spokane. He was a fighter then and still is.

Kyle pitches in the sanctioned league of the Silver Valley Horseshoe Club in Kellogg (the only NHPA sanctioned league in the state). Last week he brought his average up to 10%. He was given a pair of junior shoes by Ken Carvo of Walla Walla a few years ago and has used them up until this year. Now he insists he is big enough to use shoes "like Grampa uses."

His Grandpa just happens to be Norm Watson, also of the Silver Valley Club, and his first present to Kyle was, of course, a pair of horseshoes. They were the real thing though — straight from the barnyard and Grandpa even made a little wooden carrying case for them. Kyle has been pitching ever since he was big enough to pick them up.

Kyle was lucky enough to be born into a horseshoe pitching family. His Grandpa is Stormin' Norman of Silver Valley fame; his Mom is Vicki who has been letting everyone know she's serious

— winning her class this year in the Columbia Basin Open and the Hermiston, Oregon, Open and cashing in at the Spokane money tourney. Uncle Larr and Aunt Karen Covey are active in the Columbia Basin Club and he has several uncles and cousins who also pitch.

Kyle pitched his first sanctioned tournament last year in Spokane and proudly brought home his first trophy. He will be trying his luck this year at the Silver Valley Classic and also in the State Championship.

So it seems Kyle had no choice but to be a horseshoe pitcher but he loves the game. You'll find him out at Grampa's pits even after dark sharpening his technique and telling Mom, "I'm not ready to go home yet — just one more game!!!"

## All Tournament Directors.

With almost half our sanctioned tournaments left to play there are a few things we need to do to improve statistic keeping. Those who have had tournaments have done a good job getting the Master Sheets to me promptly. Areas which need improvement are:

1. Be sure Master Sheets are complete. That is, the win and loss record, the total number of shoes pitched, the total number of ringers and the ringer percentage for each player must be noted. Remember that playoff games count and must be included in the all those totals.
2. Be sure to include the *sanctioned tournament number* on the Master Sheet. That number must go to NatStat on my report.
3. If you have any out-of-state

players, always get their NHPA Card number and their state. Place that information on the Master Sheet next to their names.

4. Use both sides of the Master Summary Sheets if needed but put only *one class* per Master Sheet.

5. Check your score sheets and scorekeepers regularly for correctness. *(The proper method of checking scoresheets before they are added to the Master Sheets is outlined in the President's Message in this issue, page 5.)*

I'm sure there are other things that will show up as the season goes on but these are a few items that will really be helpful.

# *10th Anniversary* Silver Valley Classic

**August 14-15**

**Kellogg.** It all started in 1983 as a fun tournament sponsored by the local Kiwanis Club and was part of the old Kellogg Miners Days celebration. It continued unsanctioned until 1989 when the Silver Valley Horseshoe Club decided we would like to host the State Tournament. To do this we had to organize and hold a sanctioned tournament. In 1990 we held our first sanctioned tourney, won the bid for the State Championship and also became the first and only club in the State to conduct a NHPA sanctioned league.

The Classic has grown each year and draws pitchers from throughout the Northwest and Canada. We get serious on Saturday with the sanctioned singles. On Sunday is the Fun Doubles with the geode trophies to the winners.

The NHPA sanctioned league has worked very well for us and we urge other clubs to give it a try. We had 18 members the first year and now have 22 including 2 juniors. The paperwork is minimal — a roster sent to National at the beginning of the season and a final stat sheet to them to receive the awards and patches.

Afer the regular league play each Wednesday we do a Fun Pitch. The Club puts up \$5.00 and the names of pitchers are drawn at random. Using a set of tiny *real* horseshoes, members pitch down and back. A pitcher may win all, some or none of the pot according to how many points they score. This continues until the pot is gone or everyone has tried their luck. Needless to say, not much money changes hands but it provides a lot of chuckles and ribbing.

Our Club is now busy preparing for our own 1993 Silver Valley Classic Tounament (co-sponsored by the Kiwanas Club) on August 14 & 15 and

the State Championship August 28 & 29. We are completing cement approaches for 30-foot pitchers on eight pits and hope to do the other eight next year.

In addition to the pitching competition at the Classic Tourney, we'll be having a delicious pot-luck on Saturday evening. Following the food we're inviting anyone who can play an insrument to bring it along and do some pickin' and grinnin'. Of course, everyone will join in the sing-along!!

Sounds like a fun time in the Silver Valley in August!! Hope to see *you* here.

## NHPA or AHPA or What?

A new organization; a vicious rumor; a sore loser; a revelation or . . . really, what's this all about?

Let's think about a new different horseshoe pitchers organization in light of what is taking place in the NHPA. Are the real horseshoe pitchers, you and I, really being listened to in the administrative changes being instigated by NHPA?

Several recent changes are brought to mind. First, the basic league incentive for getting new members for charter clubs was changed to benefit the NPHA only, by causing the sanctioned league memberships to be dropped. This forces the new pitcher to join the local club, the state and the NHPA even before their pitcher knows whether or not horseshoes is going to be his bag. A member should be able to join the local and state without paying any fee to NHPA. If the member then desired to pitch in sanctioned play the NHPA fee would be understandable.

Second, the present NHPA president published only once in *NEWSLINE* before increasing dues by three dollars to cover World Tournament expenses. A tournament where less than 10% of registered members attend. Most organizations require at least two and often three or more notifications before such changes may be legally made or voted upon.

Third, it now appears the NPHA is requiring the state officers to subscribe to *NEWSLINE* before a charter or state can vote in the National meeting. I'm sure there are other peeves, complaints, etc. . . that could or should be mentioned; however these changes are real and effect each affiliated pitcher in our state.

So, why not organize a new horseshoe pitcher's association, say, the American Horseshoe Pitcher's Association (AHPA)? Why two? Why not! Lots of other sports have more than one association or conference; boxing, baseball, football, golf, etc.

## TWO INDUCTED IN TO THE NHPA HALL OF FAME

### *Spearfish, SD*

Barry Chapelle, presently Oregon's state statistician, and Art Tyson of New York were formally inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame at the conclusion of the 1993 World Tournament at Spearfish, SD.

Barry has served the NHPA in several capacities and is presently serving as Chairman of the Rules Committee, second vice-president of NHPA and always active at the World keeping things running smoothly. He has served Oregon in many capacities and is one of the managers of the big Northwest Tournament at Yakima, WA which his father helped found.
