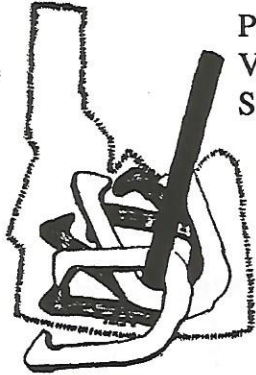

partners may exchange shoes at mid-court.

5. 50-shoe cancellation games.

Entry fee is \$17.50 which includes lunch. We will pay back the top three in each class.

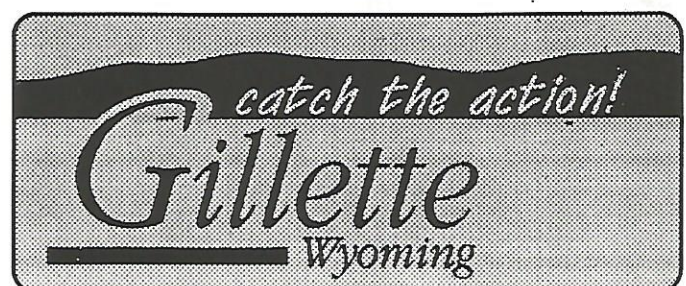
We're looking forward to seeing you.

This time it is the treatment of scorekeepers. I have seen some pitchers yelling, cussing or verbally cutting them down. I've even seen a pitcher accuse a scorekeeper p cheating. It was one of Colorado's veteran pitchers.

I've been keeping score for eight years and even now I still make a mistake now and then

So, when I'm pitching and a scorekeeper makes an unintentional mistake or has a difficult time understanding a call, I simply remember I was once in their shoes and try to be understanding.

Remember, we have a problem getting scorekeepers and sometimes it's a long, hot job with little pay. We need the scorekeepers, for without them, we might have to keep score while pitching a tournament. If this happens, we have only ourselves to blame.

Buck Walker Praised

Well we are well under way with the season so far. We have seen some membership increase here in the Boise area, how is your area doing? The Thursday night League we started up on May 2nd is looking rather good so far. We have the potential of filling up all 12 courts before mid way thru the season if things continue to go as is. We still continue to advertise weekly to generate interest to new folks and hopefully to bring out some longtime pitchers as well.

I am working with the Parks Department to try and get 4 more courts added to the existing 12 at Julia Davis Park so there can eventually be a state tournament held here. **Things are looking rather well for this possibility.**

During our first tournament (Treasure Valley Open) there was an award given out to a married couple here in Boise for their outstanding contributions to the sport of horseshoe pitching. I felt the need to start an award program which I hope will continue throughout the state. I call this the **Tournament Director Support Award**. The recipients of this award were **Bill and Millie Travis**. They have been involved in the sport for I believe 5 years now and have shown a lot of enthusiasm and have contributed greatly to the sport. They have given me not only lot of help with the courts but have inspired me to become a better director and pitcher. I congratulate both **Bill and Millie** on this award.

I would also like to remind everybody who is planning on attending the Dave's Wood Works Classic on Sunday June 30th, that we will be weighing in and measuring all horseshoes for this tournament. The reason for this, is to let everybody know whether or not the shoes you are currently using are legal for the upcoming World Tournament in Gillette. This way everybody will know

where they stand.

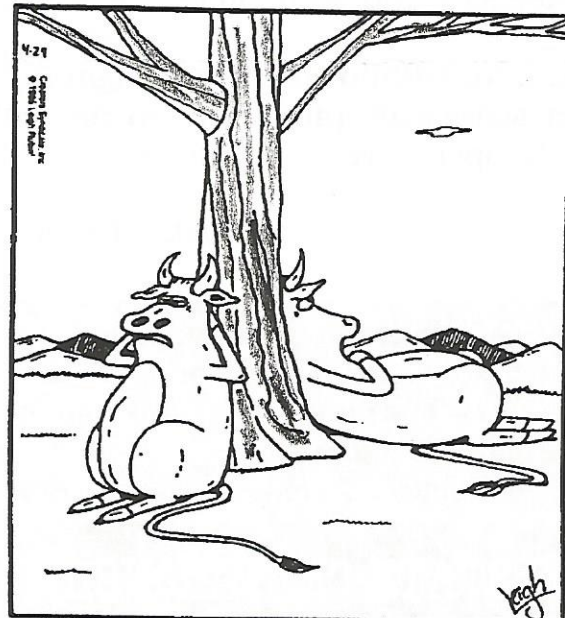
I would like to take my hat off to **Buck Walker** for his outstanding efforts in Rupert. Recently he had 8 more courts put in at the Minidoka fairgrounds. **Buck is building up the horseshoe pitching program with great success.** While talking with Buck recently, he told me that he plans on having another 20 courts added so he can eventually hold a world tournament. He has been working with the fair board and he says that they will support him all the way. If the weather turns sour he has access to a large building that will house all courts needed for the tournament. **Go get em Buck!!!**

One last thing worth mentioning is for the tournament directors. While in Rupert I was talking with Bonnie about tournament results, both sanctioned and non-sanctioned. She is asking that we also send the results to her. She is keeping the results on file.

The way it works now is that all **non-sanctioned** results must go directly from the Directors to FOUR DEAD! — at least the top three places with games won and lost, no percentages. **Sanctioned** results go from the Directors (within 24 hours) directly to the State Statisticians who, after doing the NatStat book work and computing, forward them to FOUR DEAD! which publish **all placements** with games won and lost and **percentages**. All Idaho Director-reported tournaments in the past five years have appeared in FOUR DEAD!

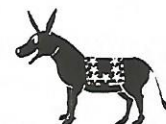
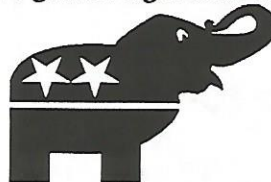

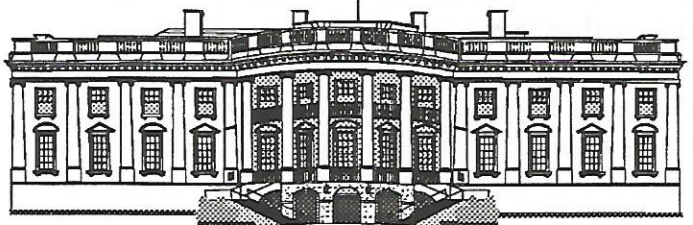

UP FOR GRABS IN 1996

Pocatello, Boise, Idaho Falls and the ISHPA

FOUR DEAD! takes justifiable pride in the efforts and accomplishments of the Boise Horseshoe Club and it's members. It is the same justifiable pride it feels when the Pocatello Club and its members do well or hosts a successful event. Their success boost the success of ISHPA.

We say the "pride is justifiable" because before FOUR DEAD! there was no Pocatello ISHPA Club, there was no Boise ISHPA Club. The two largest cities in Idaho had no relationship whatsoever with the State or National horseshoe organization. None. Naught. Nothing. **FOUR DEAD! changed all that.**

FOUR DEAD! made a contact with Ed Poppleton of Inkom in 1991 and Pocatello held its first non-sanctioned tourney at Ross Park June 23rd with Ed P. as Director. Later in the year we got Jerry Williams (and Barabra) involved, Jerry contacted the Park Department and with the help of Kent & Chester Whitworth things started to happen and a united effort produced the beautiful Brick Thompson Memorial Horseshoe Complex with the most courts (34) and now the largest membership in the State. 1992 was Pokeys first sanctioned year and they did very well with Jerry as Director and he was justly awarded the first Mr. Idaho Horseshoes. That award should still be around because there are some great, hard working, dedicated horseshoe folks who deserve it. You know who they are.

FOUR DEAD! started with the first issue of 1992 by making contact with Sharil Hill of Medidian, by rounding up the names and addresses of all the horseshoe pitchers in the Treasure Valley area. A special invitation to join ISHPA went to every pitcher giving the advantages of joining ISHPA and NHPA. All received every issue of the newsletter that year. Willie Joe Thompson was president and he lined up some of the ISHPA pitchers in southwest Idaho to help out and by August 7-8 of the following year, 1993, Boise held their first sanctioned tourney with Charlie Marquez as Director. David Spears took over the reins of the Boise Club in 1994 and things haven't been the same since. All of the largest cities in the State

were finally active in ISHPA.

The bad news is that Idaho Falls has dropped out, quit, no one to carry the ball. Last year two tourneys were scheduled and the second one (The Lyle Anderson Family Classic) was canceled by the director. None was even scheduled for 1996. There will be no horseshoe tourney in Idaho Falls in 1996. The Lyle Anderson family almost single handedly has carried Idaho Falls Horseshoes on their backs, then Lyle's back gaveout,, really, they had to give up. There was no one who would pick up the ball. Sad but true, there is a big void in Idaho horseshoes these days because Idaho Falls quit.

**BE A BOOSTER
FOR HORSESHOES**

A Bit of HORSESHOE HISTORY

(From DOUBLE RINGER of Colorado, Wyoming & Western Nebraska)

Sometimes we wonder about the value of the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association. These values can be appreciated more when you read about the early years of horseshoe pitching.

Following you will find a few excerpts about the early years:

The Spanish American was soldiers took up the game and it became one of their popular sports as it did also with the soldiers of World War I.

These soldiers, coming from all parts of the country, on their return, interested their home town folks more than ever in the game and horseshoe pitching courts were laid out in hundreds of cities, villages, and farming communities.

Kansas City, Kansas, and Kansas City, Missouri, had become quite a center of the sport and nearly every hamlet or village within a hundred or more miles had its local champion.

In 1905, there was a team match in Ottawa, Kansas. The Kansas city team had shoes made out of rasps. The contest was held on pegs two-inches high above the ground level and 38' feet apart. Players were required to stand back of the peg with toe against it. Ringer counted-3 points, leaner-2 points, and any shoe within 6 inches of the peg one point. According to the best information available at that time, the first horseshoe pitching tournament in which competition was open to the World was held during the summer of 1909 in Bronson, Kansas, and Frank Jackson, the winner, was awarded a World's Championship belt. Jackson had never heard of being able to hold a shoe so it would open toward the peg at this time, but had been practicing to find some way by holding his shoe with his finger around toe heel calk so he could pitch ringers. Games were played on dirt courts on stakes 2-inches high and 38'h feet apart. Jackson had acquired the skill of pitching a ringer over the stake and laying his second shoe on top of the shoe so that his opponent could not keep his shoe on the stake.

In 1911, the height of the stake was raised to 6 inches. Ringers counted five points, leaner counted three points, and closest shoe regardless of distance counted one point. Top ringer received

the count of ringers that were on the stake under it. Games were still 21 points. .

There was no regulation as to weight or size of shoe. One player had a shoe in which the curve on one side of the shoe was four inches more than the other side. At a Topeka tournament, Jackson used a pair of shoes he had made by a blacksmith, who bent the calks so that the shoe would slide better in the sand.

The first ruling body of the horseshoe pitching game of which records were available was organized in Kansas City, May 16, 1914. A constitution, by-laws, and rules were adopted and officers elected. The name chose was the Grand League of the American Horseshoe Pitchers' Association. Charters were granted to local leagues in many states and their rules were accepted. They rsi-1 the stake to 8 inches, established the weight of shoes so that in the 1915 Annal Tournament no shoe was used that weighed less than 2 pounds or more than 2 pounds, 3 ounces. They kept the rule that leaners counted as 3 points, ringers-5 points, and no shoe more than 6 inches from the stake wouW count.

In the winter of 1909, a go was played in Florida in the sand where sometimes ad four shoes would bury themselves so deep in the sand that they wouW all be covered out of sight. While digging out the shoes that had been pitched by Dr. F. N. Robinson from New York, and one of the pitchers who was digging out the shoes made a r ew discovery and said: wDoc, your shoes ad come fork to. " This had never been previously noticed even by the doctor himself.

The other pitchers then began to question the doctor to find out how he did it, but the doctor didn't know, only that it became natural to him to release his shoe so that it fell open toward the pag with a one and a quarter turn. He had held the shoe with his first finger around the heel calk as all others did at the time. As far as is known, this was the beginning of trying to control the open shoe in pitching, now know by every good pitcher. On May 10, 1921, the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association of the United States was incorporated under the laws of the State of Ohio with headquarters in Akron, Ohio. A year or two later, the National League of Horseshoe and Quoit Pitchers was consolidated into what we know as the NHPA today.

At the National convention at Lake Worth, Florida, February 26, 1925, the name was changed to the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association of Arnerica, which is now the only governing body of the sport in this country.
