Inner Workings of the NHPA

Ever wonder where the NHPA rules and regulations come from and how they are changed? Well briefly, the rules and regs went into one volume several years ago (2006) by having a committee write and propose a complete set of rules and present them to the NHPA via the annual convention. The new book would be called "*The Official Playing Rules, Requirements, Guidelines, and Specification for the sport of horseshoe pitching*" or "The RGS Book". The process for doing most business in the NHPA is done at the annual convention by voting delegates. The delegates come from all of the charters based on the size of its membership as outlined in the NHPA By-Laws. Idaho is authorized two delegates and a

recent change in the rules now allows proxy voting. For years, there was no proxy voting and if a charter didn't fill its seats at the convention, they could only vote the delegates that were present when the vote was called for. It now stands that the charter only needs one seat filled to vote all of their votes.

The RGS was hammered out and approved in 2006 and includes rules that state "rules" can only be changed every three years. This is meant to eliminate the yearly and rapid changing of rules based on "hot topics" or "spur of the minute" things that come up from time to time in hopes that the rules won't be changed from one year to the next depending on which delegates are present at the convention. Some items might be regional and have a better chance of passing in one region or another. Rules also must be submitted by the first of the year (the year set for rule changes) to a committee headed by an NHPA Vice President for screening. The committee works with the author of the rule to help state the rule changes clear and concise and not in conflict with other rules. If the committee deems the rule valid and meaningful, they then submit it for delegates for discussion and vote.

This year is a "rules" year. The process requires that the proposed and accepted rule changes be published in the *Newsline* prior to the World Tournament (WT) and annual convention. This gives the membership a chance to look over the proposals and give input to their state's delegates before the convention.

The delegates are chosen by the charter President and the last three years, Gary Kollmann and I have been seated as the Idaho's delegates. On non-rules years, the convention is mostly involved with the selection of the WT site, for two years out, and the NHPA officers discussing the "state of the NHPA" and WT format.

This year, several rules are proposed and the first batch of changes was just published in the latest *Newsline*. Others are scheduled for the next issue. This alone is a good reason to subscribe to the *Newsline* and I highly recommend the taking of this, our only publication devoted entirely to our sport. Hint Hint As a possible delegate or at least a clearinghouse for comments, please feel free to send comments to me via email any thoughts you may have on the proposed rule changes.

One change in particular has stirred a lot of debate. The Idaho delegates need to know how Idaho members feel about this proposal. The change is as

follows: Elder Men (become eligible to pitch in the Elders Division upon purchase of an NHPA card dated for the calendar year that they become *sixty-five* (65) years old). The rule currently reads "seventy years (70) old". The author of the change believes that the change will help keep 65-70 old pitchers with beginning physical problems in the sport and help our membership grow. He/she states that they know several pitchers who have quit pitching because of diminishing skills in this age group. Others have stated that other sports like golf and bowling separate out the older (senior) members at a much younger age. It might also be that the lower age will increase the number 30 foot pitchers making it easier to hold competitive tournaments that are not mixed. Opponents have stated that 30 foot pitchers have ruined the game and driven out many of the better 40 foot pitchers and that it would be a real mistake to increase that problem. Some feel that moving up to 30 feet is just a way to get much better very quickly. You can read various opinions concerning this proposal by reading the "Pitcher's Forum" found on the NHPA website (horseshoepitching.com) under the drop down menu entitled "Interactive". Give it some thought and do your research, then let me know how you feel. I will make sure the delegates are informed. This rule could definitely and maybe profoundly affect the NHPA. If you have feeling on the issue, be heard. Check out all of the changes, some may stir your thoughts.



Regional Director Message:



Well as we all look forward to a new season in horseshoes, I would like to mention that as we begin to look over our tournament site locations, I would like to ask that all tournament directors evaluate the courts for NHPA spec conditions. Things to check for, as many may know, are

the following:

Are the stakes at the 40 ft distance from the front of the peg to the opposing peg at ground level?

Is the stake height between 14-15 inches from ground level with a level compound surface?

Do the stakes have the 3 inch required lean from ground level to the top of the peg towards the opposing stake?

Do you have any stakes that are loose that may need adjusting?

Are all the stakes centered in the pit area?

Are all your foul lines and or starting lines marked accordingly?

Another item is that the tournament patches and certificates will be ordered as soon as we have all tournaments sites schedules turned in to Jerry Smith.

Senior Games

The 14th annual North Idaho Senior Games (NISG) will run from June 18th through June 23rd this year. The NISG are held in Lewiston, Idaho, which is located in Northern Idaho. Horseshoes is one of the sports that have been offered to participants since the beginning of the games. There are now 14 different sports, with over 65 events to choose from. The horseshoe event offers men's and women's singles and will be held Thursday, June 21, 2012, at the Lewis-Clark State College horseshoe courts on 11th Avenue in Lewiston.

The event coordinator for horseshoes is Kay Keskinen, who is the 2011 Idaho Women's Horseshoe Pitching Champion. Kay pitches in horseshoe tournaments sanctioned by the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association, and she is currently

ranked among the "Top 100" female horseshoe pitchers in the country. Kay and her doubles partner Lon have been the Moscow, Idaho summer doubles horseshoe champions each year of the league's existence, 2004-2011.

This senior event is for participants anywhere from beginners who want to learn about horseshoes to those advanced pitchers who want another opportunity to compete. Before competition begins, there will be a brief introduction to the game, the court layout, the rules, and how to score.

If you have your own set of horseshoes, please bring them. There will be a few pair of extra shoes for those who don't have any.

Equal Prize Money for Unequal Distances

Should The World Tournament offer equal prize money for the winners of each of the divisions? That's a "hot topic" lately on the NHPA web site's "interactive" discussion forum.

Three dollars of our annual NHPA dues goes to WT prize money. With the NHPA experiencing a decrease in the number of members, that means there is less prize money available for distribution at The World Tournament. (Prize money for the various divisions also comes from WT entry fees and donations.) Equal prize money for more divisions means less money available for payouts. And, along with a decrease in membership, the average age of pitchers is increasing, which then increases the number of men who pitch in the

“elder” division. From what I read, it seems that once men are eligible at the age of 70 to move up to 30 feet, almost all do; very few continue to pitch at 40 feet.

Past WT’s have had equal payouts for the men’s and women’s champions. Recently equal payouts have been added for the Elder’s division. I do not know what payouts the cadets, junior boys, and junior girls receive.

Does it take more skill to pitch well at 40 feet than at 30 feet? If so, should the payout be the same for “unequal” work? Should the 40 foot champion receive more than a 30 foot champion?

Another point made in the online posts is that it is a “choice” for older men to pitch in the Elder Men’s division. They, as do the “senior” men, qualify to pitch in the “Men’s” division. Since elder men who pitch at 30 feet choose to do so, usually to be “more competitive,” they should not benefit with equal money by pitching in the “easier” division.

I don’t have “the” answer for these questions posed about the WT payouts. But for those of you who do participate in the World, do the payouts determine which division you participate in? Does the “Men’s Champion” deserve more money than an “Elder Men’s” or “Senior Men’s” champion?

Then there is the added dimension of women’s pitching, the only category is for 30 foot pitchers.

And here I do have opinions about pitching. For background, I am a woman now 63 years old. I began pitching at the age of ten, and at 40 feet. Not until my sixtieth year when I began pitching in NHPA-sanctioned tournaments did I move up to 30 feet. But before I moved up the ten feet, I spent a long time deciding what distance I would pitch at.

Who doesn’t want to be competitive? Men who reach the age of 70 usually move to 30 feet to take the advantage. Should I? All of the other women I will pitch against will be at that distance. Why should I disadvantage myself?

At 40 feet I was competitive in the summer horseshoe leagues sponsored by the Moscow Parks and Recreation Department. I won the singles championship (three men and I were in that league) and my male doubles partner and I won all the doubles league championships when I pitched at 40 feet. When I pitched in my Minnesota home town centennial women’s horseshoe tournament, all the women pitched at 40 feet.

So I know first-hand how much easier it is to pitch at 30 feet. In what other sport are women given a 25% advantage? For example, golf has “men’s

tees” and “women’s tees.” I researched the differences in the tee distances and found, on average, that for 18 holes men’s tees had a total of about 6,500 yards while women’s tees had 5,800 yards, a difference of 700 total yards, with an average hole distance difference of 39 yards, or 10.8%.

But in horseshoe pitching, women get a 25% distance difference. Or, if one uses the difference between the 37 foot and 27 foot foul lines, it is more like a 27% advantage.

Perhaps there should also be a 40 foot division for female horseshoe pitchers. Some of the discussions on the NHPA online forum include making divisions based on distances and gender, not age. Would that be fairer?

What part does (or should) age play in pitching divisions? I am also a senior pitcher since I am older than sixty. From my own aging, I know that the arthritis in my right foot and right hand along with my eye issues and knees affect my ability to pitch. Should some accommodation be made for those of us who are older? Do our championships deserve the same money as the other divisions?

What quantifies a “champion?” Should a champion be the best of the best? Someone whose skills and abilities distinguish him or her above the other competitors? Should all horseshoe pitching champions be rewarded the same?

This article relays some thoughts related to The World Tournament payouts. If you are interested in this discussion, please visit the NHPA interactive web site. In any case, horseshoe pitching is fun, whether pitching by yourself or against others, in singles or doubles play, or at any distance. We’re all winners when we promote horseshoe pitching, a sport for all ages and abilities.

Newsletter E-Version Printing

If you are reading this, you have used Adobe Reader to access the electronic version of the ISHPA "Four Dead" newsletter. The move to an "e-version" saves on printing and postage costs while giving ISHPA members a "better" newsletter that includes graphics and photos.

There have been questions about how to print the newsletter in B&W (to save on expensive color cartridges) and how to print only certain pages (for ex, the 2012 tournament schedule on page 8).

Here are a few tips on printing with Adobe Reader. To print in B&W, one first needs to get to the "Print" options; there are two ways to get there:

1) On the toolbar in the upper left, click on "File," then slide the mouse down to "Print" and click on "Print."

or, 2) Just below the toolbar is a line of icons; click on the small image of a printer.

Now you should be in the "Print" options window.

To print in B&W, click on "Properties."

That window has three tabs at the top: "Setup," "Features," and "Advanced."

The "Setup" option will allow you to select the level of ink to use. I always use "Draft" since that uses less ink. Click the circle of the level you want.

To get B&W, click the "Advanced" tab, click on "Print in Grayscale," click the "Black only" button, and click the "OK" button at the bottom.

Now you are printing in only B&W for only this document. I have these settings set as my default print preferences since my color cartridge is empty.

After pressing the "OK" button, you should be back to the main print options page.

If you want to print only certain pages, under "Pages to Print" in the upper left, click the circle by the "Pages" line and type into the box the page numbers to print. To print one page, put that number in the box and then press "Print" in the lower right. To print many pages, put the page numbers in and separate them by commas (e.g., "1,4,6") or use a range like "5-7."

The Boise Tournaments 2012

As we approach the beginning of a new season I anticipate new pitcher's coming aboard. With that said, I would like to give you my projected tournament pitching format for the 2012 season at Julia Davis Park in Boise.

With the large separation in percentages between the top pitchers in the Treasure Valley and probably other Idaho sites as well, I foresee mixing classes to try and keep the percentages as close as possible. I also will do what I can to avoid using handicaps, but if handicaps are utilized then the pitchers in those groups will use the alternate pitch format which is an NHPA rule. I will also do my best to set up classes in which there are odd numbers of pitchers there by creating bye games which allows the group to have a scorekeeper. Scorekeepers, I believe, are important to the extent that pitchers can focus on the game at hand rather than worrying about keeping the score. The clay courts will always be prepared for play for the top (A) class pitchers and possibly others. Pre-registration will also be a requirement with the normal two day notice prior to the tournament date or Thursdays of the tournament week.

As members not only of the Treasure Valley Horseshoe Club but members of the State and National Association, I encourage and challenge all to expose this very challenging game to others and bring them out so we can build the game to where we need it. Horseshoes is a lifelong game/sport and also a family oriented sport. I discourage the use of alcohol and tobacco products in the area of the tournament in general and will take the appropriate action if needed to enforce the rules of the game set forth by the NHPA which forbids alcohol anywhere inside the fence or barricaded area.

At the Boise tournaments, every tournament will have some sort of food and drinks available for donations only. I believe it is necessary that food and drinks be available at all tournaments regardless of where you travel in the Treasure Valley. I would also like to emphasize "FUN" at the tournaments and believe that we should try and include some different types of activities or formats at our tournaments, something that will make it fun for not only the pitchers to participate in but spectators or

others as well. Incorporating fun into the tournament will make it more attractive and possibly help our membership grow. I would like to finish off by saying that with the potential of young pitchers coming aboard; awards of a non-monetary value should be given to these juniors at every tournament. Things like trophies or plaques should be given to each pitcher regardless of their final placement. I am also going to try and have the class placement plates made up for the adult classes as I believe, rather than just handing out the money, these class plates are treasured and appreciated by many.

Any man that turns 70 years of age in 2012 or is older or physically impaired person of any age may enter the ELDER MEN'S DIVISION. Provided they meet the requirements listed above. JUNIOR DIVISION entrants must be 18 years old or less for the entire 2012 calendar year.

Note # 1. A Social Security number is required from all adult pitchers that move up to the Championship Classes.

Note # 2. For class playa minimum of 48 must enter this division or it will be canceled. All entrants will then pitch in the Open Women. Note # 3. Junior Cadets must be 9 years old or younger for the entire 2012 calendar year.
