Yet, large percentage spreads in groups also drive pitchers away as most pitchers don't enjoy groups when they have no chance to win the group and often even a game. There is no easy answer.

Why? Because of the larger number of participants which allows me a chance at good fair competition. ## Regional Director/HOF



### RD Report:

Welcome all to a new year in pitching. We are challenged this year to bring new members into our sport. I just received a flyer from the new NHPA sec/treas David Sidles with the 2013 and 2014 membership numbers from Idaho and all U.S. states.

Idaho is down 5 members from the 2013 season to the 2014 season, and the total U.S. member numbers are down nationwide from 10,136 to 9,900, a loss of 236 pitchers. We as members, tournament directors, and officers are responsible for working to expose this game/sport to people with the hope of getting them to join the association to rebuild our membership.

As the new season begins it has been brought to my attention that the facilities that host sanctioned

tournaments are to be resanctioned every four (4) years.

I, as the responsible person to sanction these courts, am asking all tournament directors and others associated with running events and maintaining the courts to please measure the courts to see if they meet the NHPA specifications, and if not, to please make the necessary corrections. I plan to visit each site this year and meet with the tournament directors to confirm the court measurements if you feel the courts are in spec. The facilities I am referring to are in Boise at Julia Davis Park, Meridian at Settlers Park, Nampa at Lake View Park, Pocatello at Ross Park, and Coeur d'Alene at Winton Park.

If you are unaware of what the measurements are for the courts, they can be found in the RGS Booklet or on the NHPA website. At ground level from the front of the peg to the opposing peg should be 40 feet. The height of the peg shall not be any shorter than 14 inches and no taller than 15 inches. The lean of the peg shall be a 3-inch lean from the top of the peg to the bottom of the peg at ground level. If all your courts meet these specs, please contact me to schedule a time for me to stop by so that I can confirm these measurements and distribute a sanctioned facility flyer. I also order and distribute the patches and sanctioned tournament certificates for all scheduled 2015 tournaments. Once the schedule is finalized, I will review the schedule and order accordingly.

### HOF Report:

In 2015 there will be no inductions into the Hall of Fame, as this is done every two years. Last year three men were inducted: Jim Kosterman, Clarence Cummins, and Elmer Currie. All three of these gentlemen were very involved in horseshoes, had a passion for the sport, and went well above and beyond the norm to get inducted. I am working on a list of individuals that I feel are eligible for the Hall of Fame to induct in at the 2016 state singles expected to be held in Pocatello. If you personally know of someone that you feel had or has a passion for the game/sport who did a lot for the game and was an organizer, officer, or an outstanding pitcher, please email me at dspears1953@gmail.com and I will research this person to confirm your nomination.

### On a Personal Note:

Fellow pitchers,

Recently I have made a personal decision in horseshoes to no longer run tournaments or continue running the Monday night league in

Boise. The reason for this decision is due to other things that I would like to pursue. Horseshoe pitching has been good to me over the last 22 plus years; I have met a lot of good people and have traveled to many places nationwide. I will fulfill my duties through the 2015 year as your regional director by getting the patches and certificates out to the different tournament directors and also resanctioning the courts. The Hall of Fame will need to be put on hold until the appropriate person or persons decide to take on the position. I would like you to please consider choosing someone else to take on the Regional Director's position starting in 2016.

I am sorry if this disrupts things in the Treasure Valley and statewide, but it is something I have thought about for a couple of years now, and now is the time to make this announcement before the season gets underway.

## Moscow Horseshoes

Even though Moscow does not have an ISHPA club, it has active singles and doubles horseshoe pitching leagues that are organized by Moscow Parks and Recreation. The doubles league runs for ten weeks on Tuesday evenings and begins on May 19. The singles league is on Wednesday nights, begins on May 20, and runs for ten weeks. Participants need to register through Moscow Parks & Rec and pay a small fee.

Additionally, there will be a free horseshoe pitching clinic for adults (16+) on Tue., May 5 at 6:00 PM. Wayne Peterson and Kay Keskinen will lead the clinic that teaches beginners and those who need a refresher the basics of horseshoe pitching (rules, court layout, types of horseshoes, grips and turns) with an opportunity to pitch. Registration through Parks & Rec is encouraged so that Wayne and Kay can plan for the number of participants.

The leagues and clinics will be held at Ghormley Park in Moscow.

The City of Moscow does not currently have any horseshoe courts eligible to be sanctioned for tournament play. They do have design plans for a 12-court pitching complex to be built to NHPA specifications in Mountain View Park in Moscow (see architect's drawing below). But funding for its construction is in short supply, so the plans are on hold.



# Some Thoughts on Horseshoe Pitching Practice Routines

Much practice is done to rewire our brains, but I think to practice horseshoe pitching is to rewire our muscles. Muscle memory is such a key component in horseshoe pitching, at least in my experience.

## Warm-up First

It's a good idea to do some warm-up exercises before one begins a physical activity. I'll leave this routine to you and your physician, since I am in no way authorized to give this type of advice.

## Levels of Practice

What is the purpose of your practice session? Maybe it's a nice day out and you just want to walk and pitch some shoes, feel the warm sunshine on your body, and enjoy the fresh air. Or, maybe you are using a new pair of horseshoes and want to learn how to pitch that shoe well. Or, maybe it's competition time--league or tournament play--and you want to improve your pitching percentage.

## For Fun

To me, pitching horseshoes for fun is when I pitch 4-6 shoes from one pit to the other and don't keep score. I don't count points or ringers, I just find joy in the arc of the horseshoes as they spin and turn to the opposite stake. (Note: I am a "single flipper" pitcher.) This becomes more of a "mindfulness" exercise than physical. I take in the warm day, maybe the sounds of birds and people chattering, and basically take a walk, pitching horseshoes as I step along. My concentration level is minimal, I just walk and pitch.

## For League Play and General Competition

The next step "up" in my practice routine is to pitch two pair of horseshoes, playing one pair against the other in a game, usually to 21 points. Sometimes the four shoes may be the same model, at other times I may be trying a new pair and want to compare it to the other. One pair of my Snyder shoes plays the other pair, or maybe a pair of Grabits or Gordons play a pair of Snyders. I try not to "favor" either pair, not purposely pitching one pair "better" than the other; each pair has the same opportunity to win.

After one pair wins when it reaches 21 points, I pause to analyze why one pair beat the other. Sometimes there is no reason; sometimes I might be trying something different with one pair, such as

a different grip or release point; or if I am trying a new pair of shoes, it may be the loser since its weight or model is new to me.

## Ringer Percentage

Sanctioned tournament play requires an NHPA pitcher to have a ringer percentage. The ringer percentage then places a pitcher in a class or group of pitchers with a similar ringer percentage. To see how close I am to my current ringer average, I pitch 100 shoes, four at a time, back and forth to the two pits, counting ringers.

A goal of practice is to build muscle memory of what your successful pitch is to make a ringer. If you are above average, try to analyze why you are so successful and remember to concentrate on that sequence of motions so that you can repeat it in a game. If you are not successful, make an adjustment and see if that helps increase ringers.

Consistency with successful muscle memory movements should result in a game that is at the top of your competition level. But whatever your competition level is, enjoy the sport of pitching.

## For Serious Tournament Competition:

### How to Play Against "Mr. 75%," "Ms. 50%," and "Mr. 25%"

One of the best aspects of pitching in tournaments is to meet other pitchers and learn from them. At the 2014 Idaho state singles tournament I spoke with Gary Opper, 12-time(!) state men's champion, about his practice routine. He practices similarly to me, but he has a name for his practice pattern: "Playing Against Mr. 75%." Gary's ringer percentage is above 60%, so whatever he does is worth considering for one's own pitching.

I always encourage people to practice by pitching at least four shoes. There's a good reason it's an advantage to pitch first in competition--the first shoe has no other shoe in its way, and the second shoe only has the first shoe to contend with in the opposite pit. The second pitcher's two shoes have to deal with the first pitcher's two shoes and then one's own first shoe when one tosses the last shoe.

Pitching a ringer into the opposite pit is far easier when it's the first shoe in the pit. Once there already is a ringer (or close shoe) there, later shoes have to contend with any "bounce back" when landing on top of another shoe. The "degree of difficulty" increases when one tries to pitch a ringer on top of another ringer. To pitch four shoes that result in a call of "Four Dead" is a tough challenge, especially for the second pitcher. So, practice

should simulate as much as possible play against an opponent.

So I practice (as does Gary) with one or more shoes already placed as ringers in the pit(s). Gary's play against "Mr. 75%" means that he places two ringers in one pit and one in the other to mirror his opponent consistently pitching 3 out of 4 shoes as ringers (75%). Then he pitches his two shoes as the second pitcher in a game. If he pitches better than 75% ringers, he will beat "Mr. 75%."

My play is usually against pitchers with a 50% ringer average, so I place one shoe as a ringer in each pit and play against "Ms. 50%." Another option is to place one shoe in one pit as a ringer and then play against an opponent with a 25% ringer average.

With this setup of 1-3 ringers for one's opponent, the practice routine should provide a good representation of actual tournament competition. If one is in a slump (ringers become scarce), one's opponent will always score a ringer or two.

One other practice routine I do when I am done playing against "Ms. 50%" is to reset those two shoes as leaners instead of ringers. The difference in one's pitch for a leaner is so subtle that I want to take a little time to practice that. Mostly I add a little loft to my pitch in order to land on top of the leaner. If that first shoe lands on top of the leaner such that the leaner falls away (yes--sometimes it falls as a ringer), then my second shoe has a better chance of being a ringer.

And as in horseshoes in general, sometimes things just don't work as one intended. Physics come into play and horseshoes magically spin, bounce, or flop in a manner one never imagined.

Enjoy horseshoe pitching, whether in practice or in games.

All Entries must be on this form and mailed with a **postmark no later than May 18, 2015**. Entries received with a postmark after May 18th shall be put on a waiting list and entered into the tournament only as space is available. All adults must have pitched in a minimum of four (4) US/Canadian sanctioned events in the twelve (12) months **prior to May 18, 2015**, in the same division you are entering. Only one (1) event is required for Juniors. Exceptions for US Armed Forces members and family and foreign competitors (other than Canadians) are outlined in Rule 11, Sec D.1 of the RGS Book. Contact NHPA for more information regarding qualifying exceptions. All averages used will be the average on record in NATSTATS / CANSTATS on May 25<sup>th</sup>.

Anyone qualifying under an exception must have those scores recorded by the same date. All NHPA and any special tournament rules apply. NHPA and CANADIAN entrants must show their 2015 membership card when checking in.

You may enter at anytime prior to May 18th.

**READ CAREFULLY:** Any adult male pitching from the full distance platform may enter the **OPEN MEN'S DIVISION** regardless of age, just as any adult female may enter the **OPEN WOMEN'S DIVISION**. To enter the **SENIOR DIVISION**, you must be 60 years of age or older before the end of 2015. Any man that turns 70 years of age in 2015, is older than 70, or has an approved medical exemption may enter the **ELDER MEN'S DIVISION**. Entrants in the **JUNIOR BOY and JUNIOR GIRL DIVISION** must be 18 years old or less for the entire 2015 calendar year. **JUNIOR CADET DIVISION** entrants must be 12 years old or younger for the entire 2015 calendar year.

**Note # 1.** A Social Security number is required from all adult pitchers that move up to the Championship Classes.

**Note # 2.** For class play, a minimum of 48 must enter this division or it will be canceled. All entrants will then pitch in the Open Preliminaries.

The pitching schedule will be finalized by **May 31st** and published on the NHPA website. If you indicated above to receive the schedule by mail, it will be mailed to the address you have listed above during the first week in June.

The NHPA Hall of Fame Banquet will be held July 19th. Tickets can be purchased from the NHPA office or at the World Tournament NHPF booth.
